World System in the 21st Century: Accumulations, Polarisation versus multipolarism and Internationalist Alternatives

"In our time, given the destructive power at the disposal of the powers (ecological and military destruction), the risk, denounced by Marx in his time, that the battles will destroy all the camps that confront them, is real. The second way, on the other hand, requires the lucid and organised intervention of the internationalist front of workers and peoples".

This warning by Samir Amin remains relevant today. With the economic crisis, the situation caused by the Covid pandemic, the persistence of wars with cataclysmic risks and the environmental crisis, it is important to take stock of the reshaping of the world system, of our analyses, of its evolution and finally of the possible alternatives and options.

In the wake of historical materialism, this symposium will address re-readings of key paradigms and concepts, to better understand the world system in the 21 st century, global accumulation, the geopolitics of chaos and the possibilities of heterodox development and other internationalist and solidarity- based alternatives for building a multipolar world. Based on historical materialism and the goals of the symposium, the following question is raised:

Can a world internationalist organization or a united front of progressive organizations overcome the infantile divisions of the left and take up the challenge of organizing workers and peoples of the world?

ABOUT THE SPEAKERS AND THEIR PRESENTATIONS:

First Session

1) Abdou Ibro - The dislocation and exogenous transformation of colonized societies; a prospective loss of state sovereignty?

The development of the colonies involves a process of dislocation, the exogenous transformation of colonized societies, and the prospective loss of sovereignty of future independent states.

Abdou Ibro, economist, research lecturer at the Institut de stratégie, d'évaluation et de prospective in Niger and specialist in strategic and security foresight.

2) Cherif Salif Sy - Capitalism and the subjugation of the world's economies: a Marxist reading.

Marx questioned how to determine whether something is true: "... The question of whether thought outside practice has a reality is a question that concerns only philosophical texts". To grasp Capitalism in practice, as a civilisation and not just as an economic system, system that "culminates in Western democracy and the market".

3) Patrick Bond - "Polycrisis seen from below"

Polycrisis is defined by the World Economic Forum as "a cluster of related global risks with compounding effects," so that standard quasi-synchronised global-to-local crisis-management techniques are not as effective as they were in the past. In South African social struggles, there are seeds of a polycrisis critique and a set of solutions, *from below*, that offer seeds of hope.

4) Aluisio Bevilaqua "Collapse" of the unipolar order hegemonised by the US and the emergence of a new multipolar order

An indication of a period of deepening of the Organic Crisis of Capital as the leitmotif of the new design of global political power, demanding a cooperative strategy from the progressive and peace forces to avoid human hecatomb. This process does not mean the end of US leadership over the capitalist, a military power as effective as that seen in the countries that inherited the scientific and technological advances of socialism. Brazil, India and South Africa, in a cooperative strategy, can be joined by some of the new members of the BRICS in taking over...

Political Scientist and Doctor of Education. Senior Associate Researcher at the Centre for Advanced Studies of the Institute for Strategic Studies of the Fluminense Federal University (NEA/INEST-UFF). Founder and Editor of the newspaper Inverta. Founder and President of the Centre for Popular Education and Economic and Social Research (CEPPES), where he has been a researcher and teacher for over 30 years.

Second session:

5) Ingar Solty - The Ukraine War: Catalyst for a New Bloc Confrontation

The war in Ukraine is giving birth to a "Renaissance of American Power" and a "New Asymmetrical Trans-Atlanticism" based on a fourfold dependence of a significantly weakened and gradually de-industrializing (North-)Western Europe on the U.S. which severely restricts the EU's capacities for "strategic autonomy" and limits the EU's ability to uphold the principles of multilateralism from which especially the export-oriented EU member states, who depend equally on the U.S. and China as export markets, benefited."

6) Justin Theodra - Imperialism, eurocentrism, and historical materialism: Towards an Aminian articulation of the problematic of capitalist modernity

For Samir Amin the problematics of imperialism and eurocentrism as inseparable. Amin 'creolized' the two problematics by incorporating sociohistorical difference, false binaries, and superstructural factors into his theory of imperialism. Despite the residual methodological internalism and subliminal eurofetishism of Amin's theory, it is an indispensable reference for historical materialist research into capitalist euromodernity.

7) Beatriz Bissio - New role for the Global South: No more unconditional adherence to the Western powers policies.

The most recent events - the Ukraine war, the G20 meetings, the enlargement of the BRICS - have shown that most of the countries that used to make up the Third World prefer non-alignment to uncritical acceptance of the policies of the Western powers.

8) Matt Kirkegaard-"Building Popular Power and the Infrastructure of Internationalism in a Multipolar World."

Humanity now faces converging ecological, economic, and geopolitical crises produced by the capitalist world system, yet progressive forces across the globe are more less coordinated than ever before. These crises can only be met by the protagonism of popular and working class Southern movements to deliver a new international framework for sovereign, socialist development. To this end, the Progressive International holds we must necessarily rebuild the internationalist organization required for coordinated action by progressive forces.

9) Dimitris Konstantakopoulos

The necessity of a new "transitional program" for a "5th International"

A new "transitional program" to show the way from the present sinking capitalist "civilization" to a new world order which will guarantee the survival and the flourishing of humanity and will lay the basis for uniting the struggles and the needs of the peoples of South, of the West and of the East and also provide us with a comprehensive and inclusive answer to the different problems we are facing (ecological, social, democratic, geopolitical...)

10) Gustave Massiah - A strategy of emancipation in response to the alliance between neoliberalism and the extreme right

Emancipation is driven by the radicalism of social movements. We need to work towards a common project, a renewed utopia of emancipation, a new internationalism. Everything needs to be built: a theoretical and philosophical approach, a vision of society, a mobilising narrative, a strategy and a plan of action, a mobilising narrative, a strategy, and alliances.

11) Aziz Salmone Fall - The world system in the 21st century: resilience and response to the challenge

The world system, analyzed from a non-Eurocentric viewpoint to historicize its dialectically contradictory evolution/involution, illustrates that it reproduces itself through a megalo-ensemble. The response must be *transinternationalism*,

a bolder formula for adapting internationalism to the new economic, ecological, cultural, geopolitical and gender physiognomies imposed by globalized capitalist expansion.
